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**Title:**

Civic AI Prototype Workshop : Create a mini-prototype of an AI civic tool

Objective:

Participants will learn how to build a first version (mock-up) of a simple AI civic tool, and analyse its inclusivity.

Group Size:

Groups of 4 participants

Duration:

25–30 minutes

Instructions:**Step 1: Setup**

The teacher explains the notion of prototype: model, diagram, simple chatbot, etc.

He shares a "User journey" sheet with:

- main user
- need
- key action
- response AI
- risks / solutions

Step 2: Activity

In groups of 4, the participants:

- Choose a civic issue (e.g. waste sorting, transport, local information).
- Identify the target user.
- Draw a mini prototype on Canva or on a sheet of paper
 - application screen
 - chatbot diagram
 - card of interactions

- Add three inclusivity elements (readable font, voice, translation, simple icons...).

Step 3: Debrief

Elements for the discussion:

- What does the prototype of the chqaue group show?
- How does it meet the needs of citizens?
- Who could be excluded by the proposed solution?
- What improvements could make this tool more equitable?

Materials Needed:

- Canva / sheets of paper
- User journey sheet
- Pens, post-its
- Computer connected

Expected Outcome:

A visual mini-prototype (model or diagram), accompanied by a justification on:

- the AI function used
- the targeted user
- the elements ensuring inclusion



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
